Horsham District

The White Bridge Link

An exciting new project to link up Steyning, Bramber & Beeding

Would you like your children to cycle safely to school? Is your bike getting rusty in the shed? Does the idea of getting a bit more active outdoors appeal? And would you appreciate being able to access local businesses and amenities more easily without getting in the car?

Stevning, Bramber and Upper Beeding are right next door to each other. But we lack a safe cycling option between the three parishes.

This is a particular issue for children travelling to the various school sites. The current options involve busy roads, roundabouts and dangerous crossings. And the existing footpath across the water meadows is a muddy quagmire for several months of the year.

A working party formed in April 2022, under the auspices of the Steyning & District Community Partnership, has been busy looking at options for improving walking and cycling connections between the three communities.

So what's the plan?

We're calling it the 'The White Bridge Link' named after the metal bridge over the Adur, once painted white, which is the central to the plan.

The proposal is to upgrade the paths between

- · A consistent, durable, rolled stone surface for easier walking and cycling in all weathers and in all seasons, sympathetic with the rural location.
- Upgraded gates to enable people on bicycles, all terrain mobility scooters and people with pushchairs to

use the path.

Signage to encourage correct and respectful

Achieving full bridleway status would not be practical so the current paths will still be designated as footpaths, but with permissive cycle use.

The intention is to also upgrade the two footpath spurs that lead to St Peter's Church and to Beeding Bridge, to smoother, all-weather surfaces similar to the 'Walks For All' paths south of the bridge. So it will be a win-win for a whole range of local users.

The landowners and government agencies involved have been approached, and all have been supportive. So it's a case of 'so far so good'. The next step is to gauge public support.

Survey results show local people are taking action on the climate



The results of the 2023 Climate Action Tracker Survey are in, and they make encouraging reading. They show that change is afoot and that a sizeable number of people are taking action to address both the climate and biodiversity crisis, and the energy price crunch.

It's the second time Greening Steyning has run the survey. It asks which of 16 different steps people took last year and what they are planning for the year ahead. A big thanks to

the 108 households who filled it in

The headline results are shown in the graph. They are listed in order of how many had

taken that step, either previously (in blue), or in the past year (in green).

It is striking to see how many are taking action. On average people said they had taken more than five of these steps last year, having already taken three

Installed a heat pump Mas previously. Given the recent hike in energy prices, it is not unexpected that 'taking simple energy saving steps at home', like turning down the thermostat, and fitting LED bulbs, came top of the list, with 96% saying they had done


Other low cost steps like 'encouraging wildlife in your garden', and 'doing more top repair, reuse and recycle', were also high up the ranking. But further down the list it is significant to see that as many as 33% have now got solar panels, and 21% have switched to electric vehicles or plug-in hybrids.

Looking at the year ahead, the results shows that progress does not stop here. On average people said they are planning on taking five more of these steps in 2023, with a further two deemed as 'maybes'.

Given the number of wildlife lovers in our area, it was no surprise that 'encouraging wildlife in my garden' came top of the 'to do' list for the second year running.

But, interestingly, 'taking part in a climate campaign' came second, a sign that people are sensing the need to become more vocal in advocating for climate action.

As this was a self-selecting group, the survey results cannot be taken as representative of the community as a whole. But they



are a clear demonstration that change is starting to happen and it's local people who are leading from the front. If you are inspired to do more yourself, there's plenty of ideas on how to get started on the Greening Stevnina website.

for their wooded garden. 'In Her Hands' is a not-forprofit project that empowers women by teaching building, woodworking and DIY skills. They host pay-what-you-can workshop days just outside Steyning and host regular community volunteering events, as well as offering more regular volunteering opportunities. They use 100% reclaimed timber and teach others to upcycle wood that would otherwise improve the air quality. Lets hope this figure will be go to waste. They are regenerating the small garden space at the back of their building into a miniature forest garden, with lots of native trees and shrubs, as well as organically grown veggies for their workshop lunches. The scheme provides maintenance so there is no ongoing problem for future generations.

We would like to thank all of them for their generosity in donating and providing a memorial tree for their colleague Jim Mellor. I am sure The Tree Warden will soon be announcing the date of the planting so we can all pay our respects to this admirable man. SFT will be providing a decorative tree quard for it.

Please contact Steyning For Trees if you too would like a tree on your verge. SFT can pay the full amount but a donation of whatever size is always appreciated.

SFT is pleased to have given trees to 'In Her Hands' The Government has announced that hundreds of thousands of trees will be planted in communities across England after two funding schemes reopened for applications. The Government has committed to treble tree planting rates (30,000 hectares of trees per year) by the end of this Parliament particularly in urban areas near educational facilities and health centres which will realised. SFT is hoping to encourage authorities to use these schemes.

> The Government has also committed through its Environmental Improvements Plans to plant 35,000 miles of hedgerow a year by 2037.

As we said in our January Newsletter urban trees are almost one quarter of Britain's total tree population and represent £3.8 billion to the UK economy.

SFT are delighted that Steyning Downland Scheme have been working with the Grammar School pupils to plant the hedgerow around the Waves to Weald area as suggested by Dave Buckett our co-chair, supported by John Woodward. SFT are pleased that we have been able to donate 800 hedging plants from the National Park to enable this. It's great to be supporting SDS.

I have a poor credit rating. What can I do?



My response would be, don't panic! Individual credit reports are split into two areas, credit history and credit score. Credit history is a record what credit you have and how that credit has been managed. Are the payments on time or late, does this occur regularly etc.

It's not unusual for people to miss a credit payment now and then or pay something later than the due date. This will show up on a credit report (which is visible to all credit companies) for 6 years and forms part of your credit history.

Because it is not unusual to have these blips, the lenders will take a view on it. Depending on when it happened and how much was involved, it could be ignored completely!

The most common issues here are when an individual moves mobile service provider If there is a final balance to settle after the switch or people move and their post doesn't reach them, mobile providers are very quick in issuing default notices and this can have an impact on one's credit history.

Because they act so swiftly and rarely enter into discussions with clients, lenders tend to ignore these issues providing they are low outstanding balances typically between £250-£500.

A lenders view is that credit history is black or white, the details are either correct or incorrect. If it is believed that an individual feels the information contained on their report is wrong then it can be appealed and a record of this left on the credit report.

This is known as a notice of correction. The important thing however, is to endeavour to keep all forms of credit on time and up to date.

The other and probably trickier area, is credit score. An individuals overall personal profile is looked at and each element of that profile attracts a score. So, for example time in a job or how long someone has lived in their home are key parts of credit scoring.

One of the most important bits of information that mortgage lenders look at is if someone is registered to vote and therefore show their

details on the voters role or electoral register. If not, this can significantly reduce a credit score.

With credit scoring, lenders are looking for a potential borrower to achieve at least a minimum score (and this is different from lender to lender) to enable them to consider lending. This is looked at in the very early stages of the mortgage process and is referred to as an agreement or decision in principle.

At this point, someone will pass or fail credit score!

Failing credit score doesn't necessarily relate to a person's credit history either! We've found people with no active credit, not appearing on the voters role or recent or multiple address changes can all cause issues with credit score.

However, as I mentioned at the start, don't panic.

If a client has a low credit score but has not had any issues with their credit history, then some lenders do not credit score so we can always approach them as an option.

Quite often estate agents will ask a potential buyer if they have arranged a mortgage or have and agreement in principle. This is because they know that the prospective buyer has been assessed and is in a good position to borrow against the property they are looking at.

Steyning Community Orchard: Latest trees planted in our orchards.

February saw us planting 7 more fruit trees in our orchards in Steyning



STEYNING COMMUNITY ORCHARD

Firstly, we added 3 more trees to our newest Orchard at Abbey Road, adding to the first 3 we planted last year.

Preece's Pippin': Sheila's grandson planted an apple pip in her garden that developed into a mature tree. Sheila asked us to take grafts from this tree after his death, which we were very happy to do. We were pleased to be able as planted at Abbey Rd (see above for to plant one of these small trees here. The tree is now known as Preece's Pippin.

Ashdown Seedling: This Sussex apple is from Horsted Keynes, near Ashdown Forest. It was introduced in the 1930's and is an early ripening apple flushed red with a tangy, sharp flavour. Donated by Chris and Pat Tod.

Crimson Bramley: This tree was grown from a graft taken from one of the large Bramley trees on our main orchard on the Memorial Playing Field. Donated by Lesley Raw in memory of her husband Tony Raw.

Then later in February, we planted 4 more fruit trees in the Community Orchard on the Memorial Playing Field in Steyning. Three of them were Sussex apples, making a total of 25 Sussex apple varieties in our collection.

Green Custard: An old Sussex cooking apple, possibly from 1629. 'Custard' is believed to be a corruption of 'Costard' which is the old name for large blocky type apples, hence Costermonger (a seller of apples). Donated by Annie Noble in memory of her mum Joyce Noble.

Crawley Beauty: Found in a cottage garden in Tilgate near Crawley around 1870. A late apple with crisp juicy flesh. Late flowering so avoiding frosts. Can store until February Donated by Liz Tester in memory of her parents Jim and Jacqui Morris.

Ashdown Seedling: The same variety description). This tree was donated by Pam Lorraine in memory of her aunts Elsie and Doris Waters OBEs, who were long standing residents of Steyning. They were better known to the nation as the Radio, Film and Music Hall stars, 'Gert and Daisy', performing from the 1930's into the 1960's.

Plum. Herman: This plum is an early fruiting modern dual-purpose plum (cooking and dessert) with an excellent flavour. Developed in Sweden in 1972. We have five other plums and gages in the orchard, so this one will complement those and will help with overall pollination. Donated by Alan Baker in memory of Angela Baker.

We are now proud to have 25 Sussex variety apples in this Orchard, including rare varieties such as Bossom, Cappers Pearmain, First and

Blackjack.

Some of these are so rare that they are not in the National Fruit collection, and almost unknown outside of Sussex. The best way of preserving these old varieties is by planting them in Orchards such as ours. RB Apr 2023



Grey Squirrel



I'm crouching behind my sofa, hiding from a squirrel. While I'm here, peering angrily out of the patio window, it has given me time to reflect on the emotional journey that led me to this place.

There was a time I was nuts about squirrels. As soon as I could walk, I was out shrieking through the autumn leaves, trying to grab a squirrel's bushy tail as it nimbly skedaddled up the nearest Sycamore. Looking back now, I'm not sure what I planned to do with a squirrel, had I ever caught one. It's actually illegal to release a Grey Squirrel once caught because, despite their cute appearance, they can be extremely destructive.

The main problem is that they shouldn't really be in Britain. The Grey Squirrel is a North American species and we can blame Herbrand Russell, 11th Duke of Bedford, for inviting them. Herbrand's hare-brained plan was to import Grey Squirrels to embellish his estate at the start of the last century. Distributing squirrels as gifts, he and his landowner chums assisted their spread across England.

Our wildlife and landscape just weren't designed to accommodate this brash new American and the native Red Squirrel, already in decline, was hit particularly hard. Attempts have been made over the years to control



Britain's Grey Squirrel population and protect the remaining Reds, and the battle continues, but across most of England it seems the Greys are here to stay.

In the last few weeks the battle has arrived in my back garden. I recently purchased a bird feeding station, an elaborate chandelier draped in peanut feeders, fat balls and coconut shells. Yet the Nuthatches, tits and finches are being usurped by a Grey Squirrel. I'm paying pounds and getting peanuts and it's the squirrel who is packing his cheeks.

It feels like I have laid on a buffet for my friends, only to find some American bloke (who I don't particularly like) has turned up to scoff the whole lot. For weeks, we have been locked in an ongoing arms race. I don't want to hurt him — I just want him off my new bird feeder.

I've deployed Vaseline, peppers and counterbalances but each time I've been outwitted. He is agile, acrobatic and very clever. Today I cracked. I purchased a squirrel proof baffle: a large Perspex dome,



100% guaranteed to make my peanut feeder impregnable. I installed it as the squirrel watched curiously and, with a confident laugh, I returned to my front room...to find the squirrel was already back on the peanut feeder.

I have no idea how he's doing it and he's too smart to climb there if he's being watched. So here I am, behind the sofa, trying to find out his secret. Whether trying to beat them nationally or just in our own back gardens, it really isn't reassuring to know we're being outsmarted by a rodent.

There are many ways to write your Will these days, some choose to use solicitors, others opt for using a professionally qualified Will Writer and some will pop online and use a generic service provider. I suppose the biggest difference between all the options is the service and what you understand at the end of the process.

The question about Executors is probably one of the most frequently asked in my client meetings. It's one of those subjects shrouded in mystery and can be quite daunting for someone who doesn't have an understanding of the legal system in England. So, I thought it would be helpful to just outline a few of the key points.

To put it simply, an executor is a person named in the Will, who is legally responsible to carry out the provisions of the will in accordance with the wishes of the deceased.

What happens when you are an Executor of a Will?

As an Executor, you're legally responsible for all the money, property and possessions of the deceased otherwise known as the 'estate's assets'. This remains your responsibility until the date the estate has been settled which may include obtaining a grant of probate.

How many Executors can I have?

It's quite normal for a couple drafting mirror Wills to serve as the Executor to one another, however on second death, it's common to appoint more than one executor. For example, many parents tend to choose their adult children.

Can anyone override an Executor of a Will?

In simple terms, No! The named executor is responsible for carrying out the wishes outlined in your Will. Wills can be contested under certain grounds but that is a very different subject and probably something for another day.

A study recently reported that a daily walk prevents one in 10 early deaths!

You don't have to be a runner or play sport to feel the benefits of exercise - fitting a brisk walk into your day is good enough, UK analysis suggests.

It found if everyone did as little as 11 minutes of daily activity, one in 10 premature deaths could be prevented. Most people don't manage to do the minimum recommended 150 minutes of exercise a week, however. But doing some exercise is better than doing nothing, the researchers from the University of Cambridge say.

The NHS recommends everyone does 150-300 minutes of physical activity that raises the heart rate every week or 75-150 minutes of vigorous activity per week, which makes you breathe hard. The research team looked at hundreds of previous studies on the benefits of physical activity and concluded that even doing half the recommended amount could prevent one in 20 cases of cardiovascular disease and nearly one in 30 cases of cancer!

That equates to 75 minutes per week - or 11 minutes per day - riding a bike, walking fast, hiking, dancing or playing tennis.

'You should feel yourself moving, your heart will beat faster, but you won't necessarily feel out of breath,' says Dr Soren Brage, who led the research. Doing that amount is enough to reduce the risk of developing heart disease and stroke by 17% and cancer by 7%, the findings suggest. Regular exercise reduces body fat and blood pressure while also improving fitness, sleep and heart health Getting enjoyable activities into your weekly in the long run.

The benefits of exercise were even greater for some specific cancers, such as head and neck, gastric, leukaemia and blood cancers, but lower for lung, liver, endometrial, colon and breast cancers.

Not everyone finds it easy

to do the exercise recommended by the NHS - two out of three people say they do less than 150 mins (2.5 hours) of moderate exercise and fewer than one in 10 manage more than 300 mins (five hours) per week.

'If you are someone who finds the idea of 150 minutes of moderate-intensity physical activity a week a bit daunting, then our findings should be good news,' says Dr Brage. 'If you find that 75 minutes a week is manageable, then you could try stepping it up gradually to the full recommended amount.'

The analysis in the British Journal of Sports Medicine looked at previous published research on the benefits of exercise in nearly 100 large studies and nearly 200 peerreviewed articles to get an overview of the evidence. They calculated that if everyone in the studies had done at least 150 minutes of exercise a week - the full amount - then around one in six early deaths would be prevented.

The researchers say replacing some habits is all that is needed. For example, they advise trying to walk or cycle to work or to the shops instead of using a car or being active when playing with your children or grandchildren.

routine is the best way to increase the amount of physical activity you do, they say.

The NHS recommends adults also do activities that strengthen muscles twice a week. Yoga, Pilates, lifting weights, heavy gardening and carrying heavy shopping bags all count.







April Gardening Journal

April is when many of us get back into the garden. As the weather warms up the plants respond with fresh new growth and our gardens start to feel alive again. It's a welcome relief as there is lots to be done in April to ensure you're fully prepared for Summer - seeds to be sown and lawns to be mown. With all that work don't forget there is lots to enjoy in the garden too. Above all, it's a time where we can look forward to the longer summer evenings and enjoy the outdoors properly again.

Viburnum Plicatum Kilimanjaro Sunrise is a great small tree / shrub for all year round interest. It is absolutely covered in a profusion is a compact, slow-growing variety with of white lacecap flowers during May and June. Then, the flowers gradually change with a hint of palest pink and these are swiftly followed by a mass of crimson berries.

As if this wasn't enough, the berries develop as they age into a deep plum colour. The birds love the berries and pollinators adore the blooms. As If that wasn't enough there is often a second flush of flowers later in the season producing more berries into Autumn when the leaves turn an attractive burgundy colour.

Viburnum plicatum is a species of flowering plant in the family Adoxaceae (formerly Caprifoliaceae), native to mainland China, Korea, Japan, and Taiwan. The Latin specific

epithet plicatum means 'pleated', referring to the texture of the leaves. Kilimanjaro Sunrise heart-shaped, dark green, deeply veined leaves. It's a fantastic addition to any garden and was winner of the RHS Chelsea Flower Show Plant of the Year 2015.

Viburnum plicatums are well known for their multi-stemmed, upright, compact, slow growing habit. Kilimandjaro Sunrise reaches six feet tall and two feet wide, making it suitable as a flowering hedge, garden border, or attractive specimen shrub in the garden. It is perfect for the shrub border where space is at a premium.

To care for it properly, keep the pruning of young plants to a minimum. Any vertical shoots that threaten to spoil the distinctive tiered shape of established plants should be

cut back to their point of origin in summer after flowering.

Ideally Vibrunum plicatums should be grown in a moist but well-drained soil in full sun or partial shade. They Require minimal pruning but when necessary, remove any misplaced or diseased branches in mid-summer after flowering. It likes most aspects and thrives in direct sun as well as partial shade, as long as the soil is not too dry.

Viburnum plicatums are used as the feature plant of a border their tiered habit creates a structured and elegant look. Because of this it can often be hard to find plants that combine well with it as you don't want to distract from its beauty. Using vertical textures in the forms of grasses like Calamagrostis can work particularly well however I think their best companion would have to be hardy Geraniums.

Having something like Geranium Patricia or Psilostemon snaking its way through the lower braches of the Vibrunum can great a simple but effective combination that ensures that both plants work well together with neither out competing the other for space nor looks.

- Keep borders weed free.
- Mulch borders if not completed last month.

In the vegetable garden:

- Plant second-early and main crop potatoes
- · Pinch out the tips of broad beans if they're covered in aphids, or spray shoots with soap-based solution
- · Sow outdoor varieties of tomatoes, chillies and courgettes in pots, so they're ready to plant out in late May or June
- · Divide clumps of hardy herbs, such as lemon balm and chives, then replant in pots, borders or a dedicated herb bed
- Sow small batches of rocket and other easy salad leaves
- Sow flowering companions in the veg plot, such as pot marigolds and borage
- Continue planting batches of garlic, shallots and onions every few weeks to extend the cropping period
- · Sow herbs such as parsley, coriander, dill and chamomile in a sunny bed or container
- · Protect emerging seedlings from slugs and snails
- Sow fast-growing crops, such as radishes, to make the most of any temporary gaps

WHERE WERE THE WOMEN?

Anyone looking through the Manorial Rollsl in our museum's archives might be forgiven for thinking that either there were no women, or that they didn't matter enough to be included. In the first few pages of The 1481-1485 Roll, there are 41 men's names mentioned, and only one woman, but her name was not given.

In fact, there only two mediaeval women in our area that we know anything about. The first was Mliliana, the Anchoress of Steyning, whose destiny in the year 1250 was to be walled into a tiny stone cell within Steyning's parish church, where she was expected to lead an austere life, dispensing wisdom and spiritual advice through a squint window. However, so impressed was the Prior with her women of Steyning were gaining in self- sacrifice, that he ordered his kitchen to provide her with a daily supplies of bread, ale and a hot meal. However, when a new Prior took over in 1288, all this stopped. Instead of meekly accepting her fate, Miliana sued him in the courts, thus being the first Steyning woman we know of to crusade for a woman's rights. (Sadly she lost).

The next powerful woman we know of was the Abbbess of Syon in the 1400s, who was always known simply as 'The Lady' and everyone knew who that meant The Abbess owned Steyning and it's neighbouring villages, receiving taxes from all her properties and imposing fines if they weren't kept in good order.

From the 1600s on, we begin to find more examples of feisty women, such as Rebecca Blackwell. When

William Gereing of Wickham Farm in 1669 refused to pay his tithes to her husband, the priest, Rebecca 'with her servants, came into his ground and forcibly milked his cows six times and carried away the milk, to the value of seven shillings.' (£48 in today's money)

By the 19th and early 20th centuries, the confidence, speaking out and in forging their own futures. Women of all backgrounds dared to break down the old familiar barriers of education, status and personal freedom, taking on new roles and professions. At last they could live and work as they wished. For example, the blacksmith's daughter Sarah Cox, changed her name to Fanny Cornforth and made her way to London, where her

beauty attracted the attentions of the Pre-Raphaelite artist Dante Gabriel Rosetti, whose muse and model she became in several of his paintings.

We had our own artist in Stevning, who went by the single name of Gluck, and whose work was widely exhibited. Other female pioneers of this era included Maud Joachim a militant suffragette, imprisoned and force-fed: Eva Handley Read, the first female dental

surgeon; Carol Myerscough, Steyning's first female fire-fighter; Val Hodges; Steyning's first female butcher and Alison Settle who was War Correspondent for The Observer and Fashion Editor of Voque.

We also have or had many 20th century stars as well, including a comedy double-act, an Olympic gold medallist, an eminent human rights lawyer, a highly successful children's writer/Laureate (who saved our Post-Office) and many others.

All these women and many more are featured in our new exhibition in the Stevning Museum entitled 'WOMEN OF THE DOWNS'.
