

Repair Café Update

The repair café has now been operating for 2 years. We started when Covid restrictions were in place, and repairs were delivered to the repairer's home.

Since August 2021 we have been operating from the Beeding and Bramber Village Hall, usually on the 2nd Saturday of the month, 14:00 - 16:00. Our aim is to repair things where possible and give people peace of mind about throwing something away, knowing it really is unrepairable.

The café has been remarkably successful. We repaired 50 items in lockdown and then a further 200 in the village hall in 2021. In 2022 we received 360 items and of those, we successfully repaired 260.

The volunteer repairers have enjoyed doing this but need a huge '*Thanks*'. They have taken over 150 items home to mend in their own time.

Although we ask for a donation, it is voluntary, and if anybody feels cashstrapped they should not hesitate to bring along repairs – we want to help all parts of the local community, irrespective of your ability to donate.

Anybody who has come along will know that we provide a selection of tasty cakes, good

to make any profit on these, so they are very good value, and indeed some people come along just for cake and a chat. The Repair Café has a lovely atmosphere of community cooperation.

Many of you have also taken advantage of our sharpening service which has proven very popular. We've sharpened over 400 items, ranging from knives and scissors to secateurs, shears, loppers, axes and even scythes. Because of the volume of items, we make a £2 flat charge per item. It's still good value.



More recently, **Greening Steyning** has also been operating a **Home Energy** advice centre in the Village Hall at the same time as the Repair Café.

Our advisers will offer advice to improve the use of energy in your home, how to reduce your bills and whether renewable energy, such as solar panels is a worthwhile investment for you and what grants may be available. All our volunteers do a fabulous job, and we are lucky to have volunteers who will repair bikes, computers, electronics, watches, clocks, clothes, bags, small pieces of furniture, other wooden items, and





Steyning Community Orchard: Looking Forward...

The New Year has arrived and Spring will soon be making its presence felt. Something to look forward to!!

What will be around the corner for us I wonder? For it is a pattern evolved over the millennia, the days lengthen, the weather becomes warmer. '*Things*' begin to happen underground and a stirring commences. Fresh green leaves appear with budding of flowers and bees starting to buzz.

Perhaps it is not only us that get excited by the changes so well established. The birds and the bees certainly show an awakening, so why not flowering plants, grasses, trees and shrubs? Perhaps they also, in a way, beyond our understanding, get excited and optimistic - wondering if their flowers will be abundant and if their fruiting will be the best ever!

I like to think that they do.

The Community Orchard celebrated a Wassail in January to awaken the fruit trees and scare



away all the demons and diseases. Soon we will see their buds beginning to burst and a different colour showing in their branches.

By the end of this month, we will have planted seven more trees, four in our main Orchard on the Memorial Playing Field and three in the new Abbey Road Orchard. Over seventy fruit trees will have been planted in *'our'* orchards as well as the hundred or so in other new orchards like the ones in Bramber, Henfield and Thakeham, and we mustn't forget the many more also planted in the private gardens of Steyning, Bramber and Beeding residents.

One of the greatest joys in these newly planted orchards and individual trees, is seeing the wildlife beginning to enjoy them; bees and other insects feasting on the pollen and nectar and birds hunting in the branches for food or using the cover to hide from

predators.

How many of us have thought about why plants produce nectar? What is in it for them? Evolution shows that as plants evolved from mosses, grasses and fungi, they found they were able to entice insects to visit them with something sweet.

These insects would accidentally pick up the pollen in the flower, then carrying it to the next flower which would pollinate it and so produce fruit. All so easy!! Maybe plants are not so foolish and have ways of working out how to solve problems and make their species stronger and more successful.

So, let's hope that all our trees, awakened from sleep by the ceremony of the Wassail and with the warmth of early Spring sun and April showers, will bring forth May flowers and finally an abundance of fruit for us all to enjoy in the autumn, as juice, baked, stewed, apple pies, or best of all fresh and juicy straight off the trees.



Brimstone



It's around about now that I start getting a bit bored of winter. Don't get me wrong, I enjoy a bit of bleak beauty: bare trees, frosted landscapes and all that. But now I need something to get my heart racing. Send me a sign – some life in the graveyard of winter, a promise of those dynamic spring months ahead, a flash of colour. In February my light at the end of the tunnel is an oncoming butterfly.



On sculpted, vibrant yellow wings the Brimstone makes his elegant entrance into the New Year on those bright February days when you feel the warmth of the sun on your face.

Its distinctive yellow wings have given birth to a legend – that this 'butter-coloured fly' inspired the word butterfly. This claim may not entirely be true. Also untrue is the notion that these February Brimstones are the first signs of the year's new life. Because by the time Brimstones appear in February they are already on their last (six) legs.

Fresh Brimstone butterflies emerged from their chrysalises in late summer, so by February they could be seven months old – and in butterfly years that's ancient. Admittedly almost all of that time they've been asleep in a hedge, sheltered from the storms under Holly and Ivy. Yet despite the worst winter weather they always emerge immaculate in the spring. They must be made of Teflon.

When they awake the (bright yellow) males search for a mate, they mate, the (pale



yellow) females lay eggs and then both die. Still, an adult life of over ten months earns them the title of our longest-lived butterfly. An insect OAP.

The Brimstone's caterpillars feed on the leaves of Buckthorn and Alder Buckthorn, unobtrusive shrubs which, like the butterfly, are widespread across Sussex.

When I first became the proud owner of a garden it was only a matter of days before I evicted the gnomes and planted an Alder Buckthorn. The following spring I was excited to watch a Brimstone laying her tiny skittle shaped eggs and I studied the caterpillars as they hungrily defoliated my tree.

It's funny, people often complain to me about caterpillars eating their plants – especially cabbages (the food of Small and Large White caterpillars). Why people are concerned is beyond me. Cabbages are horrible. The only reason I would ever plant a cabbage is for the pleasure of watching something else eat it.

The first Brimstone sighting in February doesn't exactly mean that spring is starting

but it's certainly a sign that winter is starting to end. And right now that's good enough for me. Either way this yellow butterfly is a welcome messenger of what's to come – the first sulphurous spark to ignite the blaze of spring.

What to look out for in a broker.

Are they independent? - Speak directly to your bank and you'll get mortgage advice but only from one lender. Some estate agents have mortgage advisers that work from a limited panel of lenders maybe 10-14. It's probably also worth pointing out that they are not linked to your Will and effectively the agreements die with you.

The benefits of having an LPA in place are that you get to choose who makes your decisions for you, if for any reason you no longer can. For many, there is certainly some comfort in knowing that whatever awaits us, you have plans in place to make sure someone has your best interests at heart.



Watt's for Tea?

On many visits, over the years since 1964, to an old Electrical Engineer friend, the moment would arrive to be asked whether I would like some tea or coffee?

He would measure and pour 2.5 cups of water into his electric kettle, set out cups, spoons, sugar, tea bags and a plate of munchies.

Then switch on the kettle and wait for it to automatically switch off at boiling point.

Pour the boiled water into the teapot, do the necessary and we'd settle down for more conversation while we munched away.

Many years back I asked him why always the same 2.5 cups of water procedure for tea.

It's simple - I only ever boil the amount of water that I need to do the job as am careful not to waste the watts because it's wasting these that ends up causing unnecessary cost watts. which increases as the cost of electricity increases, in most cases, yearly.

It's surprising just how many times per day one boils water - if not for tea then for cooking or making warm water to wash something in the house or garden or even in one's car.

But, I countered, it can't be that much!


Well let's see:

We filled the 2000 watt kettle with 2.5 cups of cold water - switched on and timed how long it took to trip the auto cutoff switch = 117 seconds.

We cooled kettle down completely and repeated - now with 3.5 cups of cold water = 160 seconds - 43 seconds or 37% longer.

This was illuminating - one of probably the most used electrical device in the home was causing 37% power wasted with just 1 extra cup of water in excess of what was actually required.

The degree of waste amounted to paying for electricity that actually was of no benefit the household whatsoever.

The simple act of heating too much water multiplied by the number of times this is done daily and then by a million homes suddenly results in an enormous amount of wasted

This excess has to be supplied by whatever generating means, liquid fuel, gas, coal, hydro electric, wind turbine, PV Panel and nuclear, is used.

So yes it certainly does matter, not just to the end user but to every stage before the generation and afterwards down the line.

Using the kettle as an example should encourage everyone to examine their other electrical devices to see whether a similar pattern, of over use, also results in wasted watts.

Technical:

The kettle used for the timing was a standard stainless steel immersion type 2000 watt rated unit.

Different times would be obtained by your kettle so why not experiment to see what results you obtain.

There's a noticeable change in the light come mid-February, there is a glimmer of hope in the air as things brighten and it looks like Winter is almost behind us. Plants notice this change too and as the snowdrops pop up and the spring bulbs start to sprout, it provides us with colourful displays that help to lift our spirits. By the end of the month, and as the weather warms up, there are more opportunities to get out and about and appreciate nature as it awakens from its winter hibernation.

Dryopteris wallichiana is considered one of the most beautiful garden ferns. Being evergreen It provides valuable architectural form in the garden all year round. It has narrow, dark, glossy black and green foliage, making a spectacular giant clump.

Although sometimes called the "Himalayan Fern" probably for the origin of the usual cultivated strain - it is more widely distributed areas. than that, and can be found in India, China, Japan, Mexico, South America, Africa, Madagascar, the South Seas & Hawaii.

A tough, hardy fern, Wallich's wood fern produces bright green, shuttlecock-like fronds on upright, hairy stems up to 90cm high. It makes a dramatic statement in a woodland garden or under deciduous trees.

Once established, it will even grow in dry shade. The emerging fronds are covered in fine red hair like scales, appearing gold-green as they unfurl and maturing to a dark-green once established. Up close this fern also proves to be mesmerising, with the dark

brown to black rachis (stem) contrasting with the finely dissected green pinnae.

Dryopteris is a fern genus of 225 species from around the world that give us the majority of our great garden ferns. The genus name comes from the Greek words drys (tree) and pteris (fern) in possible reference to this fern's typical habitat in woodland

It is a good idea to put Dryopteris (male ferns) near Athyriums (lady ferns) to encourage reproduction. They also pair really well with Hellebores in a planting scheme, add one of my favourite shade tolerant grasses Hakonechloa macra, then you have a great trio of complimentary plants.

Dryopteris species come in a variety of shapes and sizes. Most gardeners assume that all ferns are green but Dryopteris species have variation in that regard - which ironically makes many people think they are dying or drying out. The new growth on some species may be copper or cinnamon or even black.

Like most garden ferns, Dryopteris plants prefer light shade, almost full shade. Soil wise • Sow hardy annuals for summer colour. they grow in anything that isn't too extreme. they are particularly suited to pretty much all soil types in the Sussex Weald and Downland making all Dryopteris varieties an ideal addition to any shady border.

Jobs to be done in February: **Ornamental Garden**

- In late February cut back hard (coppice) all the Cornus (Dogwood) to low buds.
- If snow falls do not let the snow sit on the shrubs, gently shake off to prevent damage.
- Prune Roses creating an open outward facing framework.
- Prune Clematis (late/summer flowering)
- Shape borders to neaten edges.
- In late February cutback deciduous grasses.
- Remove weeds from borders as necessary.
- Prune out dead; diseased or damaged wood from trees and shrubs.
- Complete pruning of Apple/ fruit trees if not already done.
- Mulch borders if not already done in Autumn – taking care of emerging bulbs.
- Cut back Hydrangea Preziosa to first healthy buds on stems.
- Cut back Hydrangea Annabelle to a half/ third to retain a compact shape.
- Cut back side shoots of wisteria, pruning to two to three buds.
- Plant new climbers such as clematis / honeysuckle
- Prune summer flowering deciduous shrubs that flower on the current year's growth -

eg., Buddleja, lavatera etc.

Vegetable Garden:

- Buy seed potatoes and chit tubers by placing them eye end up in trays or egg boxes in a light, cool, frost-free place.
- Sow crops like broad beans, lettuce etc and place in greenhouses or coldframes for an earlier harvest
- Now's the time if you want to think about planting asparagus - keep weed free and mulch with a thick layer of organic matter.
- Apply general fertiliser like growmore / blood fish and bone to beds.
- Mulch tree and cane fruit after pruning.
- Plant garlic.
- Spray dormant fruit bushes with a plant oilbased winter wash to kill overwintering eggs or aphid pests.



The Stopped Clock and a Cunning Plan

When the Rev John Goring, owner of the Wiston estate, purchased the Market House (now rebuilt at 72 Hig Street), he may have assumed that his new acquisition included Steyning's Town Clock above it, although our research suggests otherwise.

He visited his new property, whereupon he let the house below the clock to Wiliam Chatfield, a vendor of winkles and other shellfish. Next, without any consultation, Rev Goring stopped the Town Clock, which stayed, silent and still at four minutes to six, 'much to the annoyance and disgust of the inhabitants,' as reported in the West Sussex Gazette. on 4th August 1870.

Some years earlier, the previous owner of this property, the Duke of Norfolk, had given the Town Clock and its tower to the inhabitants of Steyning. This fact had been clearly stated in the deeds, but perhaps Rev Goring overlooked it. . . or chose to ignore it.

Indeed, delving through the Wiston archives we can see that he had previously been thwarted in trying to sell the Town Clock to Thomas Stedman, a Steyning watchmaker and winder of the clock.

As a Churchman and local Magistrate, Rev

John Goring had always been well known and respected in Steyning. Hence it must have created an uncomfortable situation when he put a sturdy lock on the door of the Clock-Tower, barring entry to Thomas Stedman, and impeding access to the winkle-vendor's shop.

A police constable was stationed by the locked door, which enraged the townsfolk who promptly appointed Mr. Stedman Chairman of the Clock Committee.

He acted immediately by posting a notice that the Clock and its tower belonged to the inhabitants of Steyning and could not be legally sold without their consent.

Furthermore, Stedman's notice declared that the lock must be removed and free access be given to him to wind and maintain the Clock, returning it to the correct time for the benefit of the community.

Rev Goring ignored these requests for several more days, thereby creating an uncomfortable stalemate.

Finally, some of Steyning's townspeople conceived a cunning plan. Early the following morning, Mr Chatfield, who may have enjoyed a few pints of free ale, allowed himself to be enticed away from his fish shop and across the High Street to the Chequer Inn, where he was engaged in a lengthy 'conversation' with his friends.

> When Chatfield at last made his way back home, he might have noticed what everyone else was cheering about - the hands of the clock were no longer stuck at four minutes to six

The local locksmith had forced or picked the lock, whereupon Stedman had gained access, wound and corrected the time, to the joyous relief of Steyning inhabitants, who could once again order their days by the Steyning Town Clock.
