

June Steyning Community Orchard.

People often ask how and why the Community Orchard started The idea was triggered when the 10/10 Greening group held a meeting to gather in ideas and suggestions to make Steyning 'greener'



STEYNING COMMUNITY ORCHARD

This was 2011, and as the idea crystallised, a small group approached Steyning Parish Council (SPC) suggesting that the former orchard of Lewis Woods at the far end of the Memorial Playing Field which was badly damaged in the storm of 1987 might be rescued and developed.

So the SCO was born.

Finally at a meeting of the SPC in early 2014 it was agreed that the SCO could start and clear, restore and replant the area.

Nine years later we have almost finished the replanting and restoration of this, funded by the donors of the trees planted in memory of family and friends. In addition, in partnership with the Steyning Downland Scheme (SDS), and funded by donors, we have created an orchard and children's play area at the entrance to the Rifle Range, which has be



planted with hedging; one side of which was planted by the Steyning Cubs under the watchful eye of Dave Bucket in 2010 and funded by the Women's Institute.,This was layered by the SDS volunteers with the expertise of Derek Crush in 2022.

In 2020 we began the orchard in Abbey Road in conjunction with the controlled rewilding of this area, including the pond, hedging and tree planting.

Over 80 fruit trees have been planted, all donated from within our community. We have been able to assist and advise on the creation of community orchards in Bramber, Thakeham and Henfield in addition to helping local residents wanting advice on pruning, caring for and planting of fruit trees. As the orchards approach or have achieved completion our energies now are required more for their maintenance and that of their surrounding area. Ultimately we will need the help of 2 or 3 teams of volunteers to achieve this.

One of the unanswered questions is about the need of the cages around each tree. They will be needed for longer in the MPF where the foot fall is greatest. So long as the trunks are protected from rabbits (they enjoy nibbling the bark of younger trees especially in winter) the cages in the SDO and Abbey Road may become unnecessary within 3-5 years.

It is so exciting seeing the trees maturing. Getting larger, bearing more fruit, becoming a refuge for birds and beginning to create shadows. Maturity is after 5-10 years and size depends upon the root stock on which they have been grafted. Some very vigorous, some not



Pruning occurs both in the winter, for apples and pears, and in the summer for the stone fruits like plums and cherries.

There is no doubt that we are helping the environment with all our activities; not only with the fruit trees but also the hedgerows in all three orchards. This year the spring flowers have been wonderful in the MPF. All good for the birds, bees, bats, butterflies and moths, not forgetting all of us! We need to increase our involvement of the

community, young and old, in our activities and its ownership of the orchards. It is easy to blame Covid and it may well be a factor. The fruit belongs to all of us. We must not forget that it all comes from the donations made to the orchards.

Particularly we are hoping to increase involvement of the younger generation, something we are going to address. Our long established communal activities, the autumnal juicing of apples, yours and ours, the winter Wassail, participation in the Steyning Festival and the May fair will continue.

Love to Move in the Steyning Centre every Tuesday

"An hour and a half of Wonderfulness Each Week" Promoting brain function by getting older adults moving & grooving!

Love to Move is a new and exciting age and dementia friendly exercise to music programme launched last September in the Steyning Centre in Fletchers Croft on Tuesdays each week. The programme is there to support everyone in the community. The class is run by the wonderfully vibrant Cherry Tolcher and Anna Shaw from the British Gymnastics Foundation. Supported by Sport England, the programme has been a great success since launching. With help from the Steyning Parish Council, The British Gymnastics Foundation and Sport England, Right at Home worked hard with Cherry and Anna to get everything up and running. The programme is such a success that we are very excited to have expanded from one session to the three sessions in a short space of time.

Why try Love to Move?

Love to Move is a programme specially designed to get older people moving and functioning better. As well as this, there are so many other benefits of the programme helping to improve the lives of people living with dementia:

- Social Interaction the fun and enjoyment of Love to Move makes the programme really effective.
 The exercises are enjoyable to do and encourage conversation.
- Memory stimulation trying the exercises in time to your favourite music can help to stimulate memory and recall in people living with dementia.
- Use of foundation gymnastics skills the movements used during Love to Move exercises help to develop coordination, balance, core strength and flexibility to name just a few of the many benefits.

History of Love to Move

In 2014 The British Gymnastics Foundation began working with experts in Japan who deliver their own age and dementia friendly gymnastics programme. The Japanese programme has been so successful that it is now completely state funded, taking place in every care home across Japan.

Research published in 2016 on the original Japanese programme concluded that it significantly improves walking speed.

The programme has also been shown to:

- improve cognitive function.
- help reduce depression in participants.
- · improve balance.
- improve the ability to undertake activities for daily living.

Two years ago, the Foundation began providing Love to Move in multiple care homes and community settings in the UK. To date, the programme has been delivering life-changing outcomes for many participants. The Love to Move programme has helped some participants to use their hands again so they can feed themselves, do crafts, play bingo and socialise with friends and family.

Vinal Karania, Research Manager from Age UK says 'It has a demonstrable benefit in the physical, emotional, and cognitive aspects of older people. Older people having mild to advanced forms of dementia appear to benefit the most'.

Cherry Tolcher says 'Most important is about having fun to the tunes of the 1950's and 1960's. You really see a difference in people's wellbeing as they leave the class uplifted'.

We provide refreshments and cakes after the 1-hour programme which allows our team and participants time to socialise and reconnect further in the local community. It's not uncommon to encounter initial reluctance to join at first, however we are there to support and guide participants when they arrive. We have a few of our own care staff there too, and are pleased that Hannah Smith, one of our senior carers, has just been signed off by the British Gymnastics Foundation as a professional Love to Move deliverer! We promote this programme to the clients we care for too, with great success. I am over the moon noticing the positive difference in people from one week to the next. Their confidence, ability to carry out the bilateral exercises, and happiness is a joy to see. I attend most sessions and never tire of the programme. It is varied a little each week, and we smile from ear to ear throughout the session.



A talk by by Steven Desmond: The Odd Couple: The Gardens of Edwin Lutyens & Gertrude Jekyl

In the spring of 1889 the young Edwin Lutyens, later to become the most famous British architect of the 20th century, met the artistgardener-craftswoman Gertrude Jekyll. She was a well-known eccentric, and a generation older than the young man who communicated with the world through drawings and elaborate jokes. He found in the daunting Miss Jekyll someone who empathised with his big ideas regarding design, detailing and distinctiveness. She opened social doors to him, and he brought her theories and experiments in garden-making onto the national stage. Location, Location

You might have heard that novels can be either plot-driven or character-driven, but did you know that some rely on the setting to move the story along?

Many years ago, I went to an author talk where the topic was how a novel's setting can be considered as much of a character as the main protagonist. Having always believed a story's setting to be static, a background against which the plot can be played out, I was intrigued to hear how, in some books, the setting actually interacts with the characters. Adding layers to the story. Bringing the plot to life. It was a lightbulb moment and, as I came away from the talk, I knew this was how I wanted to write my own novels.

Now, four years and many books later, I can happily say that each of my psychological thrillers has its own unique setting – a place that I hope enhances the drama. Complimenting or conflicting with the characters depending on the stage of the plot. Reacting to their actions. Participating in the drama. In June, my seventh psychological thriller, The Night Out, will be published by Bookouture and, like my other domestic dramas, its setting

plays a large part in the book – an additional character without which the story would lack atmosphere and drama.

So where is this location? Very close to home as it happens – in Shoreham-by-Sea, a few miles from Steyning, and this is how I came to choose it.

The story begins a few years ago when my husband and I became proud owners of a beach hut at Widewater Lagoon. It's where, in the summer months, sentences turn into pages and pages into chapters. Where I can swim, read and walk once my daily wordcount has been reached.

The beach is beautiful whichever way I go but if I turn east, the stones will eventually take me onto the boardwalk at Shoreham. To my right, the sea is restless or mirror flat depending on its mood. The lights of the windfarm flashing pinpricks of red into the darkness once night falls. To my left, large houses back onto the beach. Each different from its neighbour but with one thing in common – the large picture windows that stare out across the sea.

One day, as I was walking along the boardwalk in the direction of the fort, I started to wonder what those seemingly unadorned windows would look like at night once the sky had darkened –the rooms a brightly lit stage waiting for the characters to enter from the wings. I'd been looking for a new location for my next book and with the wide expanse of sea and the dark loneliness of the boardwalk where my antagonist could watch his prey through the brightly lit window, I knew I'd found it. The perfect setting for a thriller. The perfect setting for The Night Out.

But this is fiction, so instead of setting my story

But this is fiction, so instead of setting my story in one of the existing houses, I created my own using a pick-and-mix of elements from the homes I'd seen on my walk: a swimming pool from one, a spiral metal staircase from another, the palms and exotic shrubs from a third. The rest is from my imagination – as are the people who live in it. I think that the boardwalk at Shoreham is not just a geographical setting but a character in its own right. A place where, as Elise finds out to her cost, one mistake can change everything. I hope, if you decide to read The Night Out, you will think so too.

How much deposit will I need?



This is a common question we receive when clients are carrying out early enquiries on their future mortgages. One thing we always explain is that the larger the deposit, the lower the mortgage interest rate.

This is because the lender perceive a higher deposit as representing a lower risk for them especially in the event of property values dropping.

Interest rates start to increase on mortgages where the level of borrowing is above 75% of the value of the property and they do so at every 5% increment.

So for example, borrowing at 80% (with a 20% deposit) will cost less than at 85% (and a 15% deposit) and so on all the way up to 100%.

Yes, that's correct 100% meaning no deposit! Great news for first time buyers as very recently Skipton Building Society launched a product aimed at people who are currently renting but wanting to get on the housing ladder, where they haven't got a deposit but do have sufficient income to support a mortgage.

There are other schemes available where

there is no deposit required but these need to be supported by guarantors (usually Parents) so this is a first stand-alone product. There are hoops to jump through as you'd expect to get this mortgage product but that's where we come in as mortgage experts!

Stag Beetle

Sussex Wildlife Trust

I've only ever had one sporting hero. In the red corner, standing 6ft 6 and weighing in at 365lbs, Big Daddy kept my Gran and me glued to the TV set on wet Saturday afternoons as he wrestled Giant Haystacks or Kendo Nagasaki in his sequinned spandex.

In June, Stag Beetles – the big daddies of the beetle world – are emerging from the ground and getting ready to rumble. There's around 3,000 different species of beetle in Sussex and an estimated 29,000 species across Europe.

Just as Big Daddy's 64-inch chest earned him a place in the Guinness Book of Records, the 2.5 inch long Stag Beetle holds the coveted title of Europe's Biggest Beetle. And, like a 26 stone man in a spangly leotard, the adult male Stag Beetle is equally impressive and ludicrous. Its 3-segmented black and maroon armoured body is crowned with a ridiculous pair of trademark stag-like 'antlers'. They are actually modified mandible mouthparts and are used to impress the antler-less females and to grapple rival males.

Before these tiny titans step into the ring they have to put in some long hours in training. The beetle's larvae spend an incredible 5-6 years munching on a deadwood diet of buried logs and roots, building the bulky body that will sustain them to survive above ground.

As adults they will live for just a few weeks without feeding, relying solely on the fuel tanks accumulated underground. In early summer, after pupation and transformation, they burst from the ground and go looking for a fight. I always find it incredible that these chunky, bulky



beetles can fly but on warm evenings they whir through the air with the grace and subtlety of a Chinook on aerial reconnaissance for females. But if another male beats them to it that's when things get nasty.

In my fantasies I imagine these beetle brawls to play out on a dead tree stump. A crowd of over-excited elderly invertebrates gather round; the grasshoppers and crickets chirping in with a chorus of 'We shall not be moved' while the earthworms and earwigs chant 'Eas-eh! Eas-eh!' The fighters face off before charging and locking antlers. With incredible strength a Stag Beetle can lift his opponent into the air, holding him there heroically before spectacularly body-slamming them down onto the stump.

We're fortunate that southeast England is a hotspot for these Herculean heavyweights but sadly our Stag Beetles are on the ropes. The loss of old trees from the countryside has had dramatic impacts on the survival of the beetles' underground larvae and their numbers are declining.

My tip for spotting a Stag Beetle is to look for them in June in Henfield churchyard in West Sussex or around Ringmer in East Sussex.

There are many ways to write your Will these days, some choose to use solicitors, others opt for using a professionally qualified Will Writer and some will pop online and use a generic service provider. I suppose the biggest difference between all the options is the service and what you understand at the end of the process.

The question about Executors is probably one of the most frequently asked in my client meetings. It's one of those subjects shrouded in mystery and can be quite daunting for someone who doesn't have an understanding of the legal system in England. So, I thought it would be helpful to just outline a few of the key points.

To put it simply, an executor is a person named in the Will, who is legally responsible to carry out the provisions of the will in accordance with the wishes of the deceased.

What happens when you are an Executor of a Will?

As an Executor, you're legally responsible for all the money, property and possessions of the deceased otherwise known as the 'estate's assets'. This remains your responsibility until the date the estate has been settled which may include obtaining a grant of probate.

How many Executors can I have?

It's quite normal for a couple drafting mirror Wills to serve as the Executor to one another, however on second death, it's common to appoint more than one executor. For example, many parents tend to choose their adult children.

Can anyone override an Executor of a Will?

In simple terms, No! The named executor is responsible for carrying out the wishes outlined in your Will. Wills can be contested under certain grounds but that is a very different subject and probably something for another day.

Stay on Your Feet: The Importance of Balance Exercises for a Stronger, Healthier You

- Single-leg stance: Stand on one leg and hold for 30-60 seconds. Repeat on the other leg.
- Single-leg deadlift: Stand on one leg and slowly bend forward at the hips, extending the other leg behind you. Return to standing position and repeat on the other leg
- Bosu ball (balance trainer ball) squats: Stand on a Bosu ball with feet shoulderwidth apart, then slowly bend at the knees to lower into a squat. Return to standing position and repeat.
- Yoga tree pose: Stand on one leg and place the sole of the other foot on the inside of the thigh of the standing leg. Hold for 30-60 seconds and repeat on the other leg.
- Step-ups: Step up onto a step or platform with one leg, then lower back down.
 Repeat on the other leg.
- Plank with leg lift: Start in a plank position and lift one leg off the ground, holding for a few seconds before lowering back down. Repeat on the other leg.
- Balance board exercises: Stand on a balance board or wobble board and try to maintain balance while performing exercises such as squats or lunges.
- Heel-to-toe walk: Walk in a straight line, placing one foot directly in front of the other, heel to toe.

These exercises can be modified by adding weights or adjusting the duration of the hold



to increase or decrease the level of difficulty. It's important to start with easier exercises and gradually work up to more challenging ones as your balance improves.

Mark Jones at Well Adjusted Health comments 'Balance exercises are the foundation of physical wellness. They not only help prevent falls and injuries, but they also enhance overall athletic performance and quality of life.'

Mark regularly advises patients to start off with the single leg stance exercise. He suggests building this into your daily routine whilst brushing your teeth! That way you have the focus to do it twice a day and have the sink close by to help with balance at first.



by Helen Peters. Nosy Crow paperback £7.99.


Published 6th July but we will receive special signed indie editions for sale from 17th June.

In Friends and Traitors, Helen is channelling Blyton & Nancy Drew - this is a fun, gripping, spy mystery, set during WW2. The story kicks off when a private girl's boarding school is evacuated to a country manor house. Two girls, Nancy, a housemaid, and Sidney, a 'posh' pupil, stumble upon a dark plot involving the aristocratic Earl of the manor and a cabal of secret Nazi-supporters. At first, it's all a bit of a wheeze - creeping about at night, discovering secret passageways - but when Sidney's brothers Spitfire is gunned down over France, the war hits home for her and the girls realise that the Earl's plot to overthrow democracy and pave the way for Hitler to invade Britain could become a reality – and it's up to them to stop

An enjoyable romp, peppered with delightful 'jolly hockey sticks' 1940's-style dialogue, which nevertheless pays thoughtful attention to the girls' class differences, and seamlessly weaves in lots of informative background info about fascism, democracy, and WW2.







Night Ship

by Jess Kidd, Canongate paperback £9.99 A mesmerising and heartwrenching historical novel, based on a real shipwreck in 1629, which interweaves the parallel stories of two unforgettable child narrators, 350 years apart. In 1628 the Dutch merchant vessel Batavia sets sail

to the Spice Islands (present-day Indonesia). Aboard are over 300 souls: sailors, soldiers, merchants, wives & children, including our narrator, 9-year-old Mayken, travelling to join her father on his Batavian estate. Mayken soon wins the hearts of all on board, both above and below deck. As the months of

gruelling sailing tick by, conditions deteriorate in the sweltering heat, and tragically, the Batavia runs aground and is wrecked on a coral reef. Mayken is amongst the survivors who eke out a living on a tiny island, but the horror is just beginning...

350 years later, in 1989, this same island has become the home of a small community of Australian cray-fisherman, living in beachfront shacks. 9-year-old orphan Gil has just arrived on the island, sent to stay with his reclusive grandfather, Joss.

Gil becomes fascinated by local folklore about the little ghost-girl May, and ancient Aboriginal legends about the monster Bunyip, and here lie the stitches that weave the two stories delicately together. Gil's unconventional ways and dark past do not endear him to the islanders, who already have a bitter feud against his surly grandfather, and tensions begin to escalate, until the island erupts in violence. echoing the horrors of its history.

The Night Ship is a jaw-dropping story about the beauty and horror of human nature, rendered in exquisite prose, and Gil and Mayken will stay with you forever!

Steyning in Bloom Open Gardens open to All Comers



There is something magical about a garden in June; the sight and smell of roses, garden borders awash

with colour, pink, white and mauve sweet peas, hanging baskets full of bright, cheerful begonias and geraniums. All the hard work in the garden during April and May, suddenly worthwhile, with lots to show off about.

On the afternoon of the 25th of June, Steyning in Bloom provides keen gardeners with the chance to do just that. It organises a garden open day trail around Steyning when brave gardeners throw open their garden gates and welcome visitors in. Something for everyone to enjoy; the first-time gardeners and those who have been gardening for years and people who are just curious about what lies behind other people's hedges.

This year is a little different because Greening are down by 17% and moths by 25%. Just a Steyning approached Steyning in Bloom to find out if they would include some Wildlife Friendly Gardens in the trail and Steyning in Bloom said yes! So, amongst all the beautiful, carefully tended gardens, there are five quite distinctive gardens whose owners approach gardening in a different way and see it as a way to lend a much needed helping hand to all the struggling wildlife on our doorstep.

The roses may look and smell lovely, the



sweet peas may keep blooming, the garden borders may be awash with colour, but our wildlife is in trouble. Birds, mammals, reptiles, invertebrates; everything that flies, crawls, swims, moves, is facing an uncertain future. In 2019 leading professionals from more than seventy wildlife organisations produced 'The State of Nature' report that revealed that 41% of the UK species studied have declined. More than 26% of species of mammals are at risk of disappearing, while butterfly numbers taste of what is happening across the board

'So what?' You ask.

If they are in trouble, we are in trouble as well. In the UK alone there are 27,000 insect species, and they have a vital role to play in pollinating our crops, serving as a major food source for lots of other creatures, recycling nutrients, spreading seeds, enriching our soil to grow our food and eating pests. We need them for our survival on this planet.

One of the major threats to our wildlife is the loss of habitat over the last eighty years, somewhere to feed, to reproduce, to call home. We've lost 97% of our flower rich meadows since the 1920's and 87% of our wetlands.

What can we, you and I, do to reverse this situation?

Well, there are over 20 million residential gardens in the UK covering 520,000 hectares in urban areas. (In comparison Nature Reserves cover only 98,600 hectares). That's a lot of potential habitats for wildlife. We

need to learn how to manage our gardens so wildlife can benefit from them; not just survive but thrive. We need to step back, let go of the urge to control what is around us, see our gardens with different eyes and let Nature in, doing what she does best, yes, even if it involves stinging nettles.

So, buy your Open Garden ticket from the Steyning Book Shop and join the trail. Enjoy the traditional gardens, the lovely refreshments including a ploughman's lunch and visit the wildlife friendly gardens to find out more about making your patch welcome to all comers.

After the extremes of this winter many plants have suffered in our gardens, in particular penstemons, pittosporums, shrubby salvias and Hebes. It's now evident that some have not made it through the winter and its time to think about replacements.

The question is do we replace with what we had before, or do we try something different? If you like what you had before then yes replace with like for like, however if you fancy a change then why not think about something different, use this as an ideal opportunity to try something new in the garden.

Cistus, with its many hybrids and cultivars, is commonly encountered as a flowering shrub. The common name rock rose is applied to the species, a name also shared by the related genera Halimium, Helianthemum and Tuberaria, all in the family Cistaceae.

Cistus, derived from the Greek "kistos" is a genus of flowering plants in the rockrose family "Cistaceae", which contains about 20 species. They are perennial shrubs found on dry or rocky soils throughout the Mediterranean region, from Morocco and Portugal through to the Middle East, and also on the Canary Islands.

Cistus 'Silver Pink' has been very popular in gardens since its 1910 introduction to this

country, it's particularly free flowering, and forms a neat mound, with a profusion of delicate, papery, silvery-pink flowers, fading to almost white in the centre. Its great in a sunny spot at the front of a border or in a container, is one of the hardiest Cistus and is also guite drought tolerant too.

Not only is Cistus popular as a garden plant, but the leaves and stems of a few species (including Cistus ladanifer) are the source of a perfume ingredient called labdanum that has been used since the time of the ancient Egyptians. The common name, rock rose, derives from its native rocky coastal habitat and rose-like flowers. The charming rock rose flowers are usually white or pink/purple and often have distinctive maroon spots surrounding a central yellow eye.

Many Cistus are evergreen and many reach shrub-like proportions that make them popular hedge plants. But some like Silver Pink are smaller in habit. As its native habitat implies, Cistus is quite heat and drought tolerant. It also tolerates frequent pruning and poor soils. The flowers attract butterflies

but each one only lasts about a day or two. Cistus plants produce large numbers of flowers and are full of colour for 2 to 3 months in the late spring or summer.

Cistus Silver Pink is an ideal specimen shrub amongst perennial planting providing evergreen structure in the winter months when the other plants have retreated, hibernating underground. In the summer its flowers mingle and work alongside the flowering herbaceous so it very much becomes part of the summer planting scheme too.

Good planting companions would include Papaver, Aster, Astrantia and Salvia - as well as grasses like Miscanthus, Panicum or Pennisetum too. As long as the soils not too wet in the winter this little shrub will provide you with interest all year round, an ideal addition to any scheme.

Jobs to be doing this month include: Ornamental Garden:

- Lightly trim box balls traditionally on Derby Day 6th June!! Would be nice to encourage the box topiary to grow larger while retaining the shape.
- Deadheading Salvias as the flower heads go over, penstemons, roses etc.
- · Spray any plants infected with aphids or black fly.
- Weed!!!
- · Prune early flowering clematis.
- · Cut back foliage of tulips.
- Trim other shrubs to shape as necessary.

plants by applying a glyphosate based weedkiller to their leaves. Prune ornamental cherries after their flowers have faded.

· Plant warm season grasses such as

Treat bindweed/groundelder and other

invasive weeds growing among other

penisetum and panicum

- There is still time to sow quick germinating annuals such as cosmos.
- · Sow winter bedding such as violas etc.
- Cut back oriental poppies/pulmonaria etc after they have flowered. Remove all leaf as well to allow for fresh leave to sprout.
- Remove reverted shoots form variegated shrubs etc.

Vegetable Garden:

- · Direct Sow carrots for autumn and winter harvest
- · Sow Florence fennel and chicory.
- Plant out leeks once they are pencil thick.
- · Put straw round strawberries.
- · Water potatoes for good sized tubers.
- Feed tomatoes regularly
- · Ventilate greenhouse.

The Bridge, the Bishop and the Disreputable Prior

In the summer of 1839, the trustees of the turnpike road running from Horsham through Steyning and Bramber towards Shoreham decided that the causeway to the west of Beeding Bridge needed to be repaired.

They set to work and found water-worn flint beach cobbles supported by wooden piles carrying the road over the marshy edges of the River. Then, some two feet below the road surface, not far from St. Mary's House, they exposed the remains of a long forgotten but substantial stone bridge.

On digging down further it became apparent that the surface of the bridge – which no longer survived – had been supported by three piers. The wide central pier which extended south of the roadway itself was, they discovered later, the base for a small chapel dedicated to St. Mary, which had been built there for the spiritual sustenance of travellers.

In 1412 an inventory showed that the chapel had only a few sorry possessions – one old missal, one red vestment, two old linen towels, a bell and a wooden osculatory (a tablet to be kissed during the mass). However, by 1839, few signs of the chapel remained other than some broken floor tiles

in the rubble. What the workmen did find in abundance, though, was blocks of Sussex Marble, a hard limestone, used to sheath the piers of the bridge.

When the bridge had become too dilapidated to repair all

the stone above the waterline must have fallen into the river or been robbed out by local people. Indeed, in 1839, in pursuit of the same tradition, the best of the remaining blocks of stone were sold off to Sir Charles Burrell for the reconstruction of Horton farmhouse.

It was as researchers were finding out about the bridge that they encountered the bishop and the disreputable prior. Richard Alleyn had acquired the position of the Prior of Sele Priory by dubious means in the mid 15th century and became known as 'a notorious dilapidator, waster, and alienator of its possessions and ancient evidences'.

Among other things he robbed the priory of '26 draught oxen, 80 young wether beastes, 80 swyne, 10 pounds in honey, 2 macers [bowls] bounde with sylver uncovered, together with many salts, chalices, and cruets of silver, granges full of corn, the household furniture and carts, besides running the house into debt.'

Sele Priory, a small foundation on a bluff overlooking the river close to Beeding Church. should have been maintaining the bridge and saying masses in the chapel but, needless to say, Richard

Alleyn was not interested in doing so. The bridge and chapel fell into disrepair.

The energetic Bishop Waynflete of Winchester then acquired the patronage of the Priory – which he transferred to his new foundation of Magdalene College, Oxford – dislodged the Prior and set about repairing the bridge.

In 1477 he contracted with John Cowper, a Winchester mason, that for £19 he should hew 100 loads of stone to make the repairs. The Bishop agreed to pay for 'the carriage of the stone, lime and sand plus the timber for the scaffolds;' with the further proviso 'that the said John shall employ as much as possible of the old stone, for which the Bishop shall pay him IOd. a load.'

Three years later John Cowper was still working on the 'peris, archis, and wallis and upon a chapel'. At that stage he agreed with Bishop Waynflete to 'hew sufficient stone for

the further repair of the Bridge' for which he negotiated a payment of 'twenty marks [£13 6s 8d) and a gown.' The gown must have been quite a grand bit of clothing to have been included as part of the deal John struck with the bishop.

However successful John Cowper's repairs were, they failed to provide a permanent solution. It seems likely that no money was forthcoming to repair any subsequent dilapidations and that, with this arm of the river silting up and with the chapel no longer being needed for Anglican rituals, the incentive to do so diminished.
